



Gordon Gerald Deichmann

September 7, 1928 - October 9, 2021

Gordon G. Deichmann, 93, of Central City, Nebraska died Saturday, October 9, 2021 at Litzenberg Memorial Long-Term Care in Central City. Funeral Services will be Wednesday, October 13, 2021 at 2 p.m. at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Central City with Rev. Richard Kothe officiating. Visitation will be Tuesday, October 12, 2021 at St Paul's Lutheran Church from 5-7p.m. Burial will be in the Central City Cemetery.

Gordon was born September 7, 1928 to Paul and Verna (Botsch) Deichmann in Leigh, Nebraska. They moved to Central City when Gordon was five years old. He attended country school through the 8th grade and attended Central City Public School until he graduated in 1945. Gordon worked on the farm till he joined the United States Army in 1951. He was stationed at Ft Leonard Wood in Missouri and was honorably discharged in 1953. Gordon came back to the farm where he had cattle and helped his Dad farm. He married Jewell Hughes in the fall of 1953 and they lived west of Central City on the Smith Farm. They moved to Chapman for 15 years. In 1969, they moved to the current farm where Gordon would live for the remainder of his life.

Gordon enjoyed serving the community in many organizations. He was on the school board for many years and also on the FFA board. Gordon was on the 4-H council and chairman for many years. He had his own 4-H club, The Busy

Beavers, for 25 years and loved to work with the children, especially the cattle they were showing. He had his own herd of Polled Hereford Cattle since the age of 12. Gordon helped his own children show cattle at the County and State Fair, Ak-Sar-Ben, Denver Stock Show, and several different states. He helped build the 4-H building and cattle barn at the Merrick County Fairgrounds. Gordon was chairman of the Lone Tree Township until the age of 90. He belonged to St. Paul's Lutheran Church and was very active there. He was active in the American Legion as part of the Honor Guard at funerals and marching in parades. Gordon was an active member of the Farmers Union. Those left to cherish Gordon's memory are his wife, Jewell of Central City; his children, Deb Vesely of Chapman, David Deichmann of Central City, Denise Mellott of Rowlett, TX, Deanna (Brad) Kline of Keokuk, IA, and Darrin (Roxanne) Deichmann of Norfolk; 21 grandchildren; and 23 great grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents; several grandchildren; and great-grandchildren.
